Women's Ministry

Redeemed, how I love to proclaim it, redeemed by the blood of the Lamb.

“I am who You say I am.”

What a beautiful Saturday we shared together at the Redemption of Jacob's Well Women's Conference. So thankful for every woman who came, worshipped, shared, prayed, and encountered the love and redemption of Jesus.

Roxanne Francis, our guest speaker, shared how honored she felt to have the opportunity to speak with the women of OSAC. She reminded us how beautiful it is that God meets us as we gather together in His name. He is a gentle and loving Father who continues to pursue us faithfully, just as He has throughout history.

Through the stories of Dinah and the woman at the well, we were reminded that God sees, values, and redeems His daughters. The fact that their stories were included in His Holy Word gives us the opportunity to learn, reflect, and have meaningful conversations together today in 2026.

Roxanne led us through Scripture with compassion and truth, reassuring us that we are redeemed as God has proclaimed, and that we are fully seen and deeply loved by Him.

We were given opportunities to have deeper conversations around the delicate stories of Dinah in Genesis 34 and the woman at the well in John 4. Roxanne guided us through thoughtful questions such as, “How do you think God showed up in this situation?” and “Are you open to the Lord refining who you are, like He did with the woman at the well?”

These conversations created exciting and life-giving opportunities to share openly within our roundtable settings. Roxanne invited us into healthy and meaningful discussions surrounding these topics, encouraging us to seek the Lord together and reflect deeply on His love, grace, and refining work in our lives.



We are so grateful for the ministries that OSAC provides, allowing us to continue having meaningful conversations and opportunities for healing, growth, and deeper connection with the Lord.

We are especially thankful to Heidi Lucas for joining us that day and leading us through a listening prayer experience. Heidi and her team gather on the first Tuesday of every month from 7–9 p.m., October through June, guiding participants through exercises in listening to God's voice and growing deeper in relationship with Him.

We also have our Healing Prayer Ministry, which is part of the Truth and Freedom Discipleship Ministry here at OSAC. Personal healing prayer appointments are available with trained team members for anyone who may feel trapped, overwhelmed, hurt, or helpless in an area of life and would like to bring those burdens to Jesus. During these appointments, individuals meet with two trained sisters in Christ who have both been equipped in and personally experienced healing prayer themselves.

We also want to mention Janice Frizzell, a local Christian counsellor who shares office space with us here at Owen Sound Alliance Church. Janice has experience and training primarily with adults, both individuals and couples, in areas including depression, anxiety, coping with stress and life transitions, trauma, relationship struggles, grief, and loss.

Thank you again to Janice Campbell for pursuing this vision and for her heart to see women gather together, have honest conversations, and seek the Lord for answers. Janice has already shared that she is planning for next year's conference, and we are so grateful for her leadership and dedication. As well a thank you to the ladies that helped in the kitchen, made sandwiches, salads and to those that helped set up and clean up.

ESL Ministry Year-End Update

This past year we had 14 students in our full-time ESL program, along with 6 additional participants who joined us for conversation classes from January through May. It has been a joy to watch relationships form—between students, volunteers, and the wider church community—and to see people not only learning English, but also finding connection and belonging in the church.

A highlight this year has been working alongside and mentoring Rebekah as she explored missions through newcomer ministry. It has been a joy to watch her natural ability to welcome people, build trust, and help others feel welcome. We are excited to continue walking with her as she explores what God might be calling her to and as we stay connected with the relationships formed this year.

In the fall we will be seeing a shift. With a low number of students planning to return and no new refugee sponsorship arrivals expected, together with Rebekah, we have decided not to continue running a full-time ESL program as we have for the past 10 years. Looking back, we are amazed by all that God has done through this ministry—hundreds of people supported, loved, and connected into the life of the church through the faithful service of so many incredible volunteers.

Moving forward, we hope to continue supporting newcomers in simpler and more relational ways. This includes 1-on-1 tutoring and the development of a weekly conversation club where newcomers can practice English, explore Bible stories, and build relationships with each other and with church volunteers.

While this is a change from how the ministry has looked in the past, we sense it may also open new doors. In God's hands, we trust this next season can still be a meaningful expression of love and outreach to newcomers in Owen Sound through OSAC.

I am so grateful for the opportunity to serve in the ESL ministry this year and to see God work in both the volunteers and the students. Watching the students become friends is truly a memorable thing. As one of our volunteers said, "It is so beautiful to see a Muslim and a Christian sitting together as friends, no matter what's going on in the world around us". I am excited to see what God has in store next and to use all the experience I have gained through this ministry in the years ahead.

We are so thankful to all our dedicated volunteers. What a blessing it has been to serve alongside such a caring and committed group of people. Your willingness to invest not only in teaching English but also in building meaningful relationships has made a lasting impact on the lives of our students.

Missions Yesterday and Today

Now that “Dabbling with Daba” is out for all to enjoy, I thought I would take this chance to talk about one of the big reasons that I went to Senegal. But before I do I wanted to thank Gary and Sharon Howell, Mike and Nikki Howell and both Bill and Ilana Lobbezoo for their time and thoughts. The sacrifice of their time and their insights into the subject of missions made this discussion possible. And further to that, their great desire and commitment to see people across many people groups be moved to a faith centred around the sufficiency of Jesus is and has been inspirational.

So to the point of this article.....I’ve thought a great deal about what I want to accomplish through these words and I’ve come to decide upon two points: 1. To outline with a few areas of interest how missions in our modern world has and is changing and 2. To encourage those who might consider going outside our country to be a part of what God is doing.

A discussion of the changing environment in international work could be endless. With that in mind I have chosen a few areas to focus on: transportation, communication, connecting with culture and raising ministry support.

Transportation to and from any part of the area people serve is so important and, as Bill will tell you, it takes a large part of the international worker’s day. Take Mike for instance; the days he takes his kids to school, the drive to and from school is easily over 45 minutes each way. Vehicle needs require an ability to travel from highways we see at home to very challenging dirt paths. Interacting with the country workers can truly be a cross country event.

In the area of communication, I think I’ll step back into the past before I mention some of the ways that are used today. My aunt served in the sixties with one of the first teams that went with an organization called “Literature Crusades”. She served 3 month long terms in India, Pakistan and Singapore. While there, the three or four couples split up and the men walked the streets of the major cities distributing tracts in English. The women stayed in their residence doing home-based logistics, which included cooking and responding to written answers to questions asked in the tract distribution.

Mary Catto, who was a C&MA Missionary with her husband Harold spent time each week writing a letter to her mother which was then sent home by air post. Face to face contact with home came only when she and Harold were on furlough. The best parts of them being home were the stories that Harold would tell about daily excursions into the jungle. That was a missions report back in the day.

Today is very different. Yes, we've moved passed the frustrating days of Skype to FaceTime. We now have the instant ability to visually contact many of our international worker friends (given that we take into account the time shifts between here and wherever they are). You can receive a group message from Andy and Dave Foster and know what is of concern almost in the moment. If you want to keep up with Mike and Nikki Howell you can be a part of a group which receives monthly updates about their work. Knowing right away and no waiting. We hope they experience the same kind of encouragement coming back their way.

Connecting with the people or people groups that an international worker finds in the context of where God places them is them is vital. How to do that continues to change. When Gary and Sharon moved to Gabon they moved to a place where Sharon's parents had begun a work with the people of that country. They were an extension of the preaching and teaching that had been established. When they moved to the Congo, their work became more about reaching the youth of that country in a new and effective way; not a junior church format but discussions on topics that were of interest to kids, and new settings like youth camps, not classrooms. (Fun fact: Africa has 41% of its population under 15 and 70% under 30).

Their move to Senegal had them shift their focus from youth leaders to field team leaders. They moved from a country not based in the Muslim faith to one that was dominated by it; from a culture that had a power/fear base to one that viewed life with an honour/shame context, there were changes to adjust to and help lead others toward.

For Bill and Ilana, connection meant using a commonly used vehicle of language. The first was the desire to learn English. The other was computer technology. Both made it possible to reach another large group of young people.

What really makes this happen though, is language. It's why Mike and Nikki spent two years learning Wolof and improving their French. French, the language of business, and Wolof, the language of everyday life. With their language training in place and in practice, the Howell family can move in and around local life in Senegal and connect with its culture. When our group from OSAC visited the Howells in November last year, it became very evident that without the simplest forms of language even a basic greeting couldn't happen. But as Bill Lobbezoo reminds us, even with all this in place, the international worker is still the foreigner in the country that God has placed them. It is still the love of God that makes the true and lasting connection.

Culture is on display from the first step you take out of the airplane (we aren't in Kansas anymore Dorthy!). So complex and so different yet important that those there begin to understand how culture can affect everything. Let's take Senegal as our example. Understanding the importance of greeting those you meet as you go from one part of the day to the next is essential. Not taking the time to greet someone can prevent any conversation with that individual later in that day. Taking the time not only builds possibilities for more conversation but builds relationship.

Recognizing that Senegal is a predominately Muslim country is very important as well. It means that their world view is based on a “honour/shame” context where honour is sought after and shame is avoided. This view is supported and reinforced by a very close community and family structure. In this culture, men are the primary figures in family life. As a result, mission work is segregated along gender roles, with Mike reaching out to other men through skill development and work in the trades, and Nikki out regularly working in medical and speech support with women and children.

The need to support our International Workers has never been greater than it is today, even though it's become easier to do so. In the past, my dad would put a cheque (in Canadian dollars) in the mail and it would arrive at a mission's headquarters or even on rare occasion, into the hands of the international workers themselves. It all took time. Today we can send funds electronically directly into accounts around the world. Simpler and faster for sure. Often in the past, a note was attached to the donation. That reach out made a more personal connection.

But what of other support like prayer or words of encouragement? This type of support is as vital as it ever has been. Money makes things possible but words in prayer move hearts. Many are aware that prayer that is specific targets the needs experienced by those working on the international scene. Our mission is to become aware of those details.

In the past, written reports came home often each quarter and were placed in or on mission bulletin boards. The modern methods of communication of email updates, FaceTime and other same day methods have given us real time knowledge of what is happening. The challenge is still there. We need to pick up the phone or tablet and make that connection. We can then truly see through their eyes the challenges that our friends are facing.

So where do we take this from these few words? Well, I think that being informed is a start. And the good news is that this action is something we can all take. Let's come alongside these international workers by name and encourage them by getting to know what happens day to day in their context.

To you who would consider allowing God to prod you to move towards being in the international setting somewhere in this world of ours.....listen to the Holy Spirit and consider in prayer what is opening up where you are. Being willing is a great first step. God will do the rest. He will prepare you for what lies ahead in your journey to serve that great command to “go into the world and make disciples”.

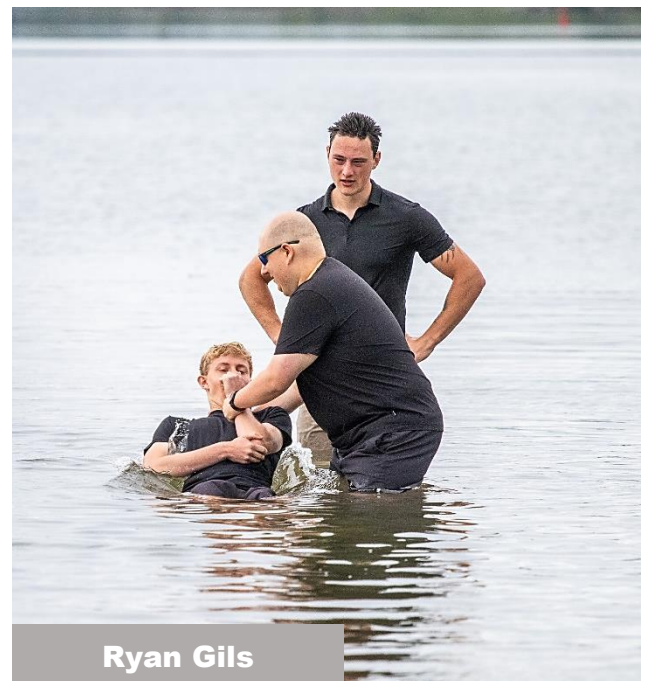

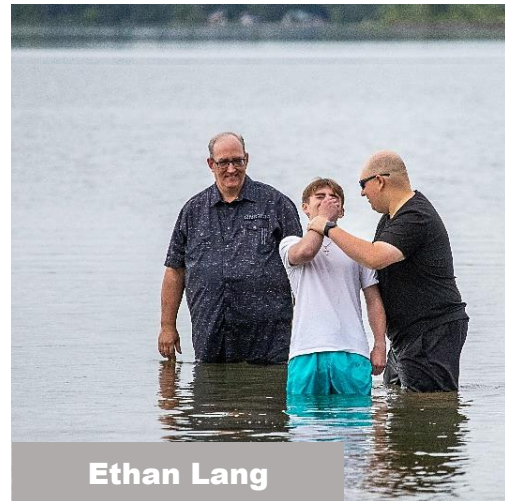

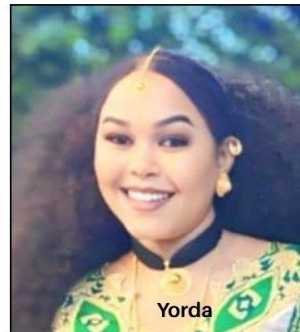
